

## Japanese Mons

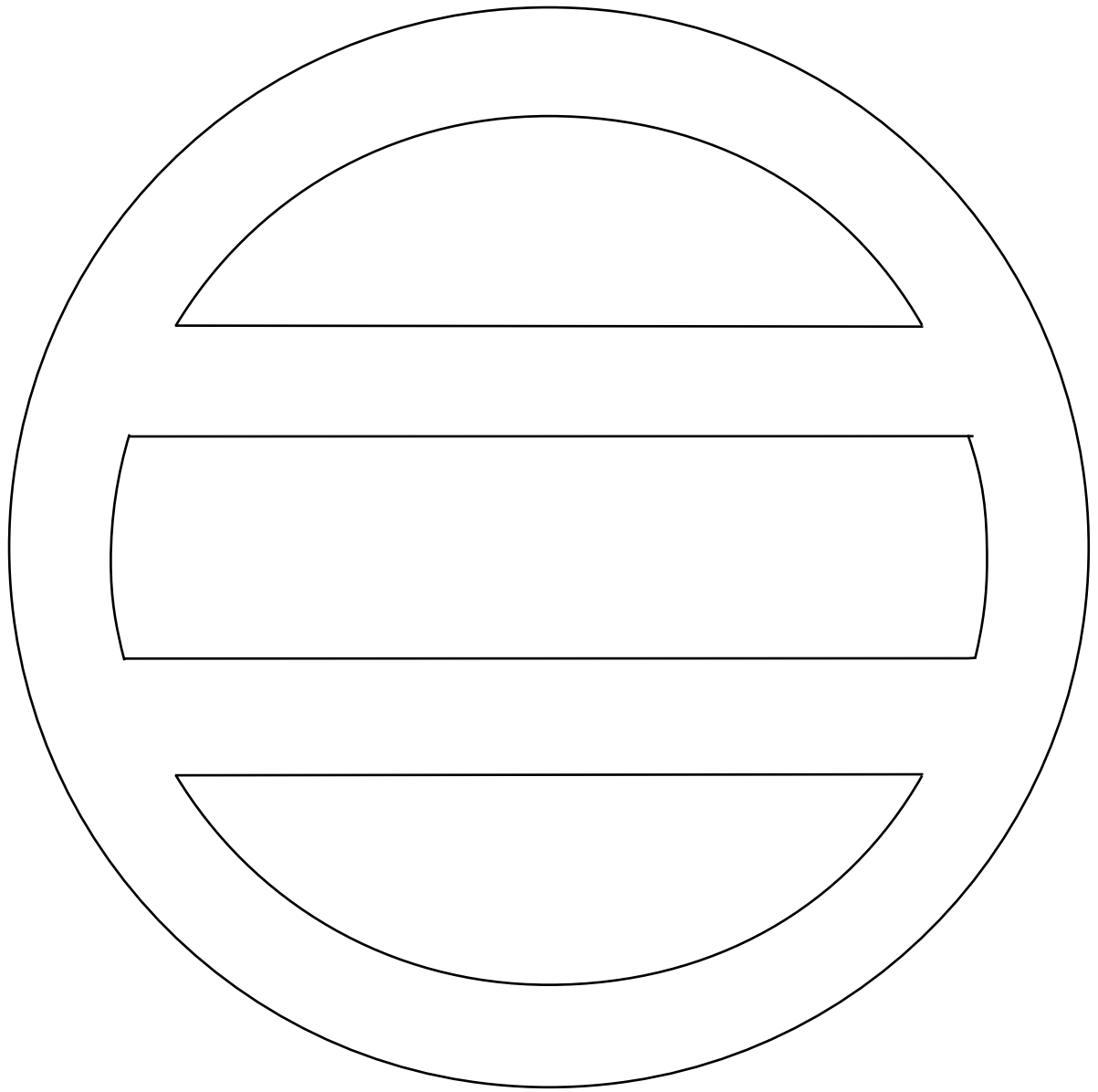
The illustrations are Japanese Mons, or house tokens.

Each Mon represents a different house.

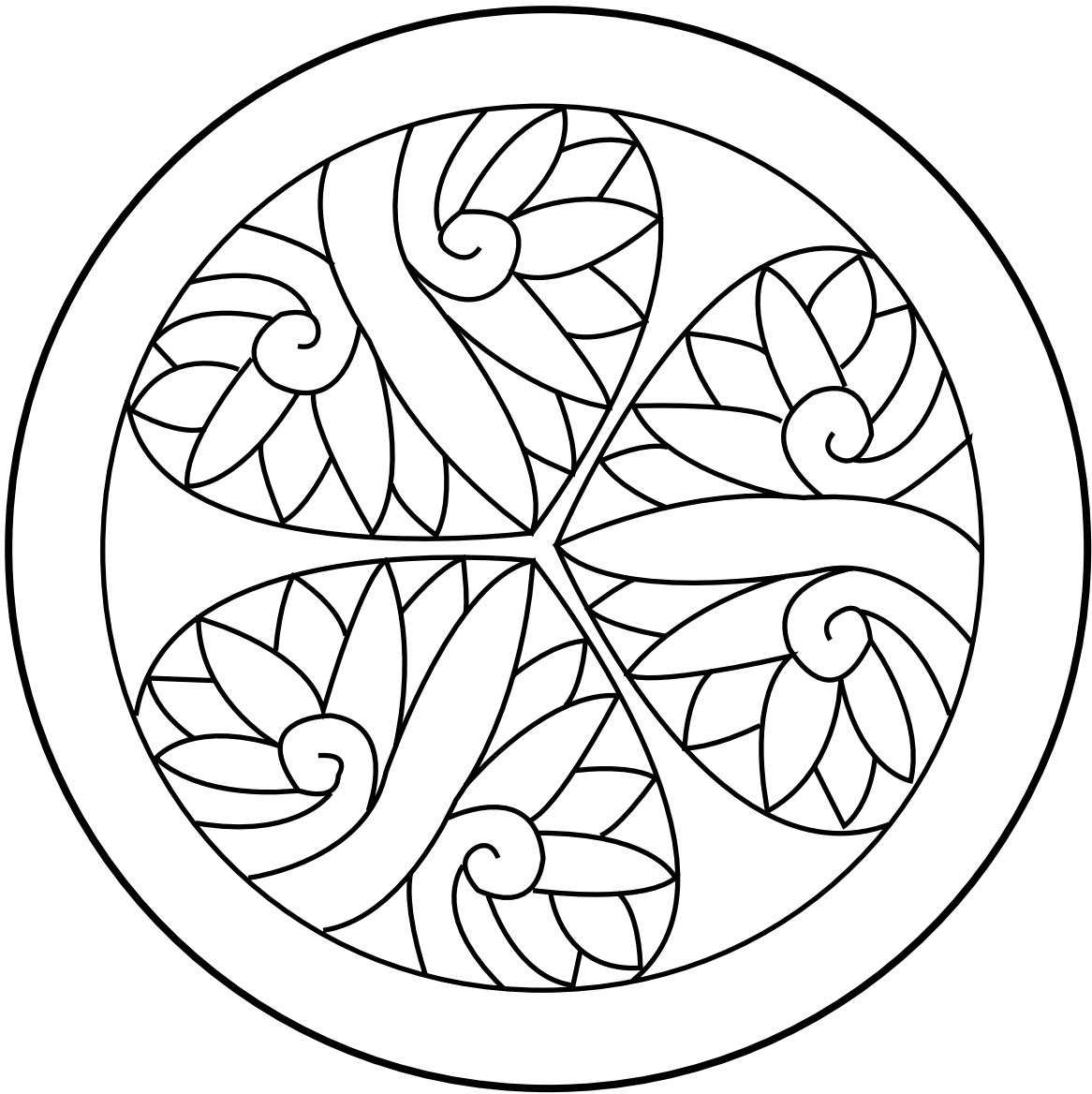
These decorations would appear on weapons, armour, clothing, in rooms, and on furniture.

The upper class Japanese would have his Mon in three different places upon his kimono.

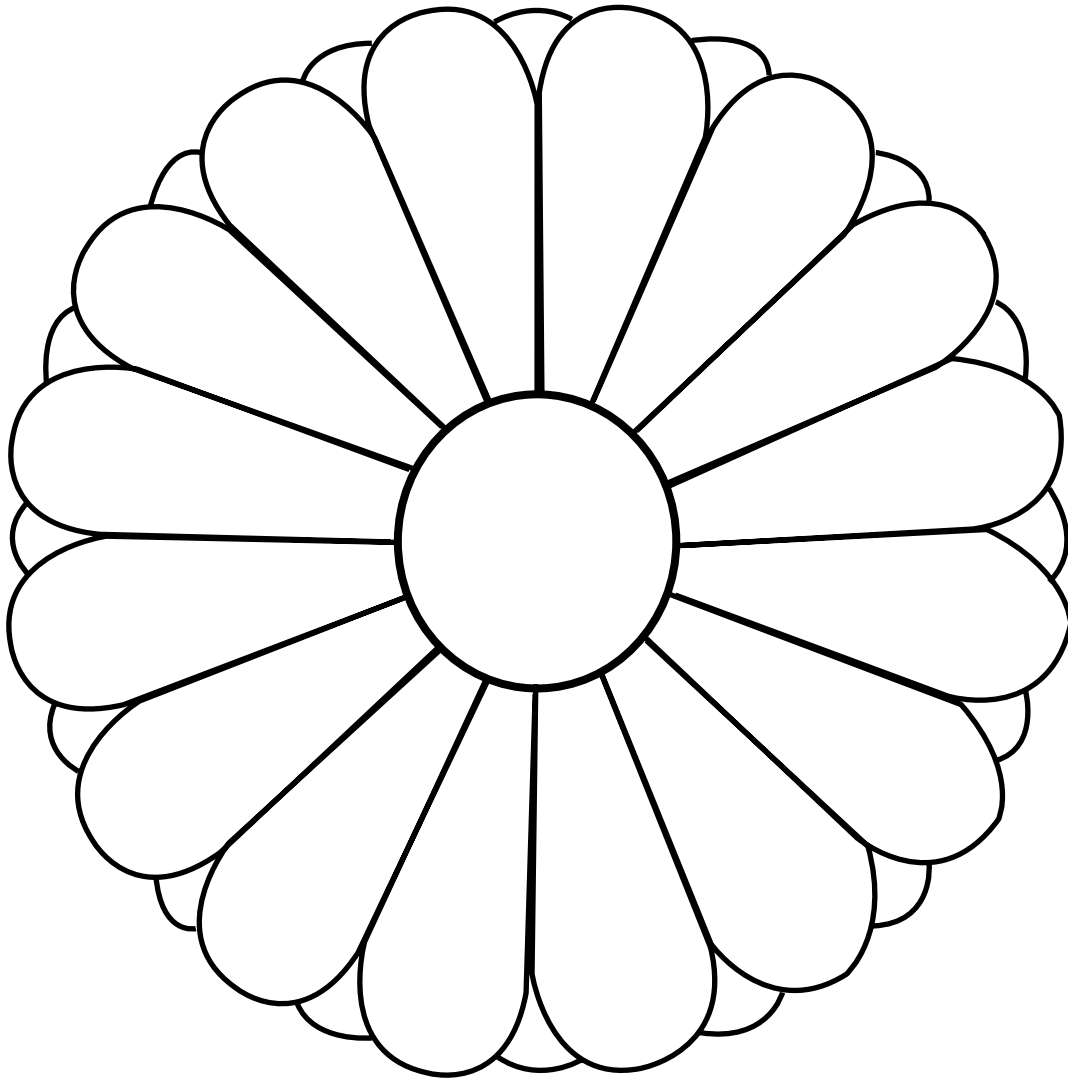

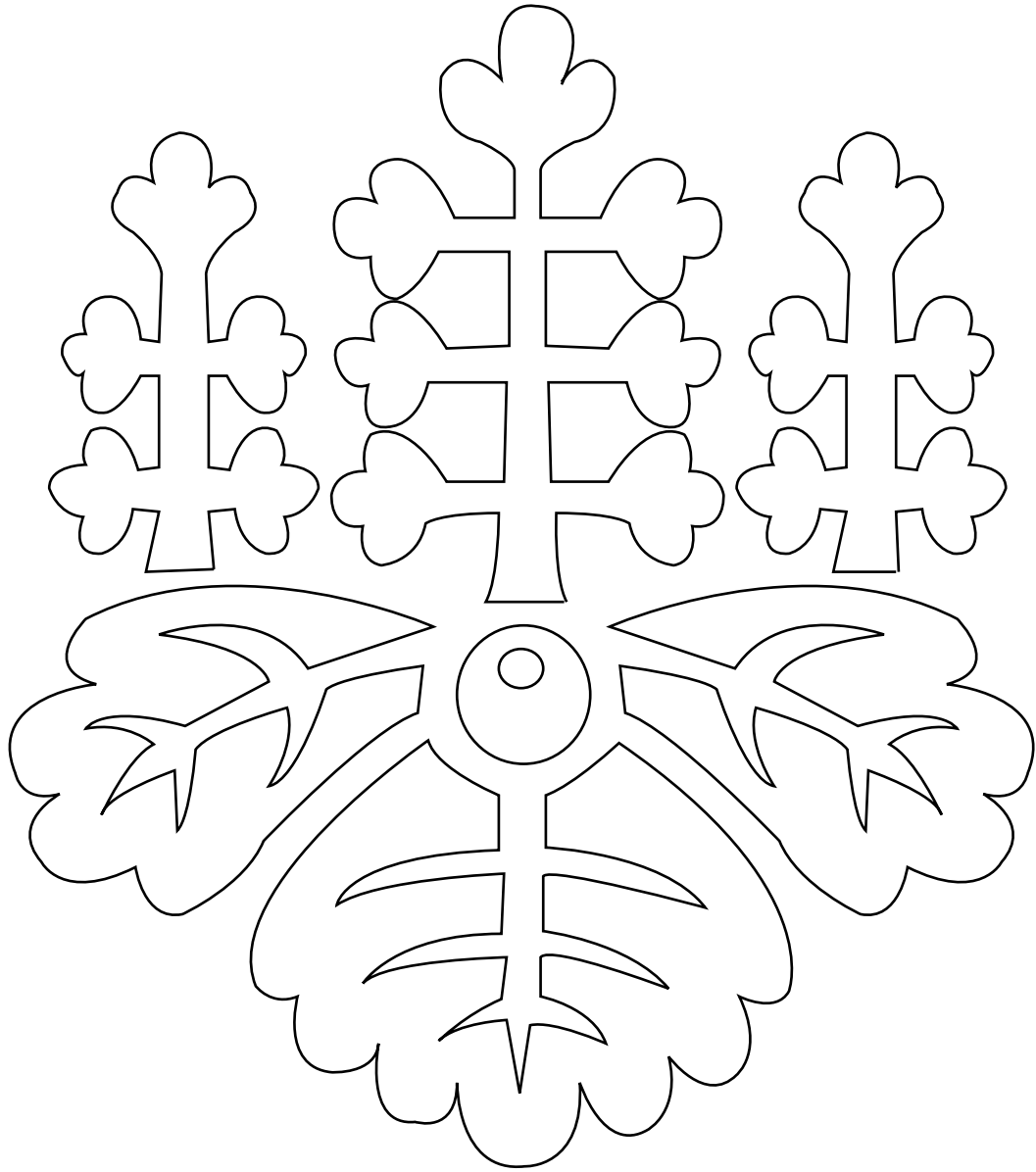
Family token (mon) of the

Ashikaya.



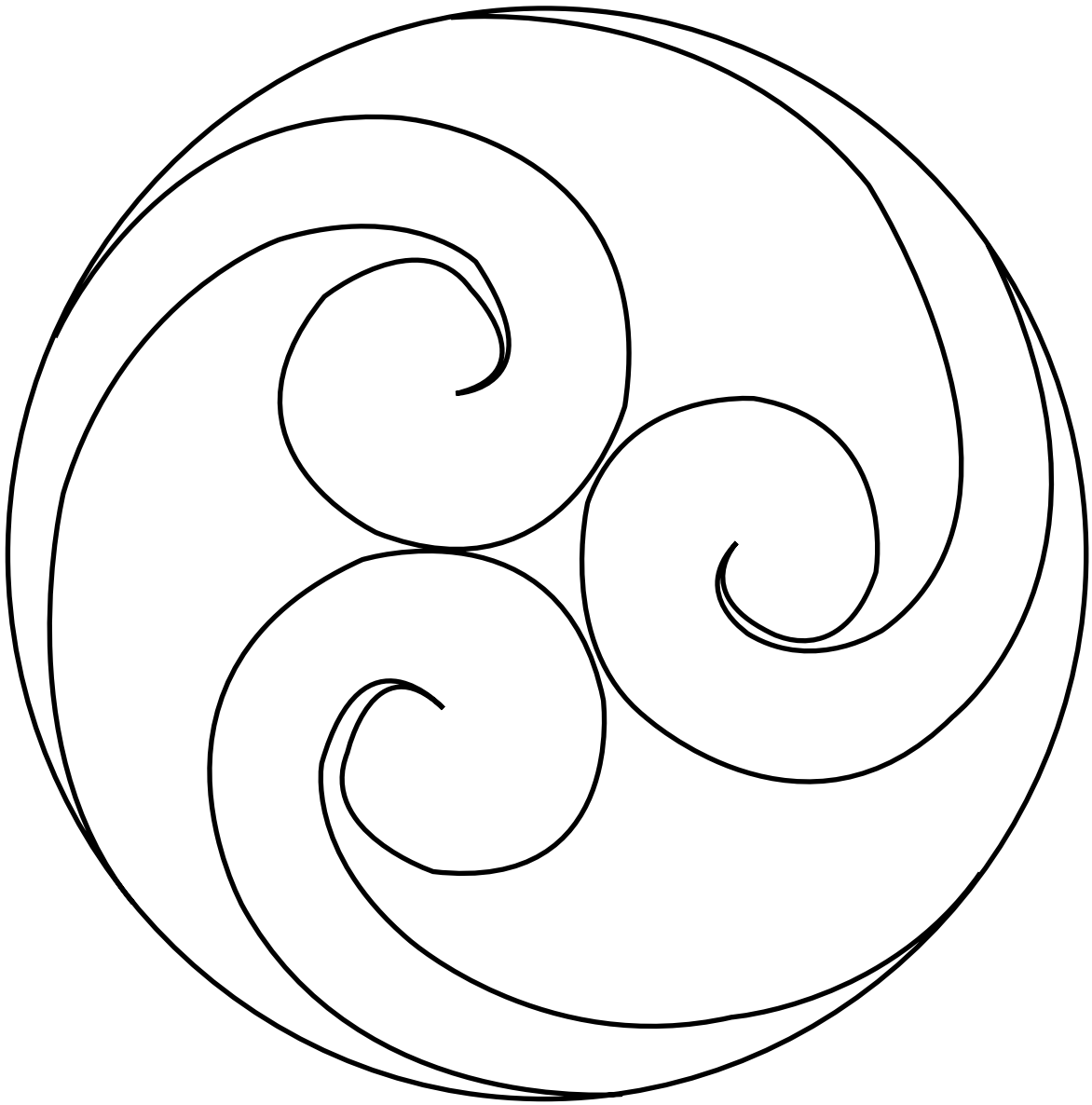
Awoi-mon.
